CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The college follows the affiliating university-prescribed curriculum. For effective implementation of curricula, the academic calendar and activity calendar is prepared and uploaded on college website. At the beginning, each department prepares a course-distribution plan. In the departmental meetings, the syllabi are allotted to teachers. Discussions are held on the methodologies to adopt for teaching and learning. Departments prepare a tentative plan to check the feasibility of delivering the allotted curriculum by calculating the number of lectures and practical available in a particular semester. Teachers are then required to submit a teaching plan based on the number of days required for teaching of the syllabus, and also the number of days required for conduction of examinations. Teacher's diary helps teachers for reframing perceptions and assumptions and it's a great help in changing and adapting suitable methodologies for an efficient learning environment in the future and manage this entire process effectively. An individual teacher designs their own teaching diary mainly focused on academic circulars from the university, available working and teaching days and is periodically checked by the principal. This helps to monitor if the teaching plans have been successfully implemented, and this is further verified and substantiated through student's feedback on teachers. Internal examinations are conducted according to university guidelines. Teachers conduct the seminars, assignments, unit tests, common tests, group discussions, power point presentations, industrial/ study tours and projects for the students. Teacher provides models and specimen answers sheets, hard copies, CD's and web-site addresses to the students to enhance their knowledge. On-line and off- line e-resources, excursions, industrial visits, fieldwork and demonstration methods are also used. Besides, face to face interaction in the class encourages students to express themselves freely and ask questions for a better learning experience. Library facilitates the effective implementation of curricula by providing required text books, reference books, journals, e-books, etc. to the faculties and students. The university prepares academic calendar that specifies the duration of the semester. Teachers participate in orientation/ refresher and other courses/ training programmes to enhance modern teaching techniques and are updated. Teachers attend meetings of academic bodies like Academic Council, Board of Studies, etc. Teachers are motivated by organizing programmes on teaching skills, use of library facilities, etc. Some teachers actively participate in framing the curriculum in their capacity as members of the 'Board of Studies' for their respective subjects. The institution aids in every way to upgrade the infrastructure and procure resources for effective delivery of the curricula. Slow and advanced learners are treated in different ways. Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners. Advanced learners have scope to experiment and go beyond the course while doing regular work and thereby to improve their presentation skill. For the meritorious students extra coaching, project works are given to help their representation in intercollegiate competitions. Toppers are encouraged with cash prizes. The institution celebrates various days of national and international importance to inculcate values and unity among the students.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

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The institution collects the feedback on curriculum aspects and courses from different stakeholder such as students, alumni, faculty and parents. We have adopted a procedure for analysis of collected feedback based on 5 point scale. Analysis is made by observing students performance, faculty performance in every semester, utilization of infrastructure and requirements for quality enrichment. The college conduct annual Alumni meet, in which suggestion and feedback is received from Alumni students. The provided feedback data is analysed. Whenever any alumni visit the college, feedback is sought. College websites invites alumni to provide feedback online. After collecting and assessing the feedback from the various stakeholders on curricular aspects, the valuable suggestions, if any, will be brought to the notice of the University Curriculum Committee for due changes in the course structure. Analysis of collected feedback is placed before IQAC to take necessary action. Furthermore, analysis of collected feedback is made available on college website. College follows a continuous review of the curriculum through IQAC. The functioning of various committees of the college is modified time to time as required by the feedback. Besides, efforts are made to integrate socially relevant issues into the curriculum.

The Coordination Committee organizes 'Principal's Address' for the newly admitted students. Through this event students are introduced with teaching learning and evaluation programs along with college discipline and various students' support services. Students are encouraged to ask questions and to freely express their concerns if any. Entry Level Test is organized for the first year students to identify advanced and slow learners. We have Palak Yojna (PY) through which 18 to 20 students are adopted by each teacher who is expected to provide academic and personal guidance to his wards and also keep in touch with their parents. Regular attendance, good academic performance and multiple participation of students especially of slow learners is facilitated and ensured under PY. The personal problems of slow learners are also addressed through PY. The personal interactions and cordial relationships between students and teachers through PY help easy identification of the problems. Most of the students are tribal with a very poor educational background. Teachers make efforts like giving them extra study material and enhancing their language skills. They are helped through personal accompaniment and emotional support. Counseling is provided to parents of poor learners when required. Data on the problems of the students is collected, compiled, analyzed and used to help the students more effectively. Advanced learners are provided with extra reading materials, books, primary works, and reference material and are guided to browse internet for advanced material. Visits to training centers and industries are arranged, and opportunities are provided to participate in industrial visits as well as skill oriented and research trainings. ICT based teaching learning works as an effective platform for teacherstudent academic interactions. MOODLE is incorporated for teaching learning process by some departments. Projects are allotted to students making them develop skills to think scientifically and inculcate research temperament. Assignments and seminars encourage selfstudy and develop self reliance of students. Regular field work/visits experiences are shared in the class. Issues and concerns are discussed in the classes which promote students to build up their thoughts. It creates independent learning among the students. Appropriate perspective of students towards such problems and concerns is streamlined. WiFi enabled departments allow students to easily access the elearning resources. Movies relevant to the demand of syllabi are screened. Confidence and capacity building strategies for students include library orientation, soft skills development, life skills training, awareness training programmes for utilizing institutional facilities etc. Programmes are organized on useful topics like stress management, goal setting, communication skills, personality development, time management, healthy competitive spirit etc. Team work and leadership skills are instilled into students through group discussions and project work. Through students' inter subject seminar competition and projects information and knowledge management skills are enhanced. They share newly acquired expertise among themselves and generate a student centric atmosphere in premises. Contact details of the faculty are provided on the college web site. The students can contact teachers for any clarification regarding the academics. The teachers are always available to the students to solve their difficulties.

2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

We have introduced MOODLE for continuous internal evaluation. We motivated students to participate in certificate courses available on MOOCs. For the same we have conducted a drive for registration of students on SWAYAM. Besides this, college has an examination committee for effective implementation of internal evaluation. The committee plans and implements assessment process to evaluate the students' performance. Evaluation procedure is carried out as per the university norms and in stipulated time frame. The modifications changes in examination and evaluation are brought to the notice of all by circulating a copy of the university ordinance. Notices and announcements in prevention of unfair means are circulated. The bases of continuous internal evaluation are: written test, term examination, lectures, library notes, students seminar, short quizzes, assignments, group discussion, extension work. Field works/visits are also a part of assessment in some subjects, and the evaluation is done on overall performance of the student during the visit and a comprehensive report submitted thereon. Method of MCQ tests has been incorporated. Slow and advanced learners are treated differently. Behavioural aspects of students are evaluated on the basis of interest in academics, skill learning, capabilities like problem solving, team work and overall response to activities. The same is discussed in detail with students. Students as well as their parents are adequately informed about examination and evaluation criteria. Institution and University have a Grievance Redressal Cell to which students can appeal. Parent teacher provides personal attention to grieving students and ensures that they are satisfied.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The college has builtin mechanism to ensure smooth conduct of examination, evaluation and other related matters within the planned time frame. Planning and organizing the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules is completed in the beginning of every academic year, through formulating academic calendar, teaching evaluation plan. At the end of every academic session, the academic calendar for the next session is prepared, taking the affiliating University's academic plan into consideration. The details are provided in the college prospectus, academic diary prescribed to the teaching staff and on the college website. The department wise timetable for examination and other related matters is prepared in the beginning of each semester by respective HOD. The time table is displayed on the notice board and discussed in detail with students. Affiliating University has prescribed the semester system for all programmes in the faculties of Sciences, Arts and Commerce, which has been adopted by the college as it is. The students are examined and their works are evaluated as per the schedule norms of affiliating University and college internal examination committee. Changes in schedules, if any, are brought to the notice of all concerned. Faculty wise Coordination committee ensures and monitors all academic matters. Besides academic calendar, College activity plan covering all events is also prepared. The same is uploaded on college website and duly circulated among all the concerned. Continuous monitoring by the principal, IQAC, coordination committee, HODs, and a periodic meet with the management ensure effective implementation of the planning.

1. Constitution of College Development Committee (CDC): College Development Committee (CDC) is the constitutional body that the college is required to set up under the state universities act. The composition of the committee ensures the participation of the important stakeholders. The CDC comprises the members from teachers, nonteaching staff, students, the society, academicians and the management. All the important policy decisions regarding the academic administration of the college are discussed and approved by the CDC. It also governs the financial management. It also approves major submissions to the Authorities, especially Government bodies, NAAC and University for appropriateness and effectiveness of required information. In a way CDC ensures the decentralization of responsibilities and power and acts as role model for participative management. 2. Formation of various college committees: For the decentralization of the authority and operational autonomy various important committees are formed like IQAC, UGC Planning and Management Board, Purchase Committee, Faculty Coordination Committee, Research Club, Cultural Committee, Library Advisory Committee, Building Committee and Sports Committee, etc. Principal as the head of the institution provides autonomy to all the

committees and the departments in planning and implementation. The budgetary

provisions are made as per the requirement of each department. The amount is allotted and utilized based on priority with the approval of purchase committee. Head of the department has academic functional freedom. He allocates the workload, prepare timetable, conducts Test Seminars, etc. under the guidelines given by the principal and university. Institution promotes a culture of participative management as the Principal is given freehand by the Management of the institution. The Principal exercises his powers effectively. He is the Chairman of the staff council and all teaching and nonteaching staff are the members. Through interactions with HODs and faculties better implementation of all academic programmes is done. Departments and the various committees coordinate with IQAC and submit the annual plans. These are approved by IQAC and Planning board.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice I: 1. Title of the practice: Employability skills of students 2. Objectives: • To enhance employability skills of students • To promote the practice of earn while learn 3. The Context: As most of the students come from below poverty level background they cannot afford education. Just to make both ends meet their entire family needs to work. Keeping someone in education is keeping someone out from earning bread. As an attempt to address this problem we established the 'Entrepreneurship Development Cell'. The Entrepreneurship Development Cell works to promote the practice of 'Earn while Learn' and conducts various skill development training programmes leading to selfwage employment. Along with this some other departments of the college try their utmost to open up a few avenues as regards employment. 4. The Practice: • Workshop on Bamboo Crafts and sale: The ED cell in collaboration with an NGO in Melghat 'Sampurna Bamboo Kendra', has been working for the betterment of tribal. A 21days training on Bamboo Crafts was arranged. Around 40 students were benefited from this. During this training they manufactured the various crafts worth Rs. 6000.00. We facilitated the sale of goods through the outlets and stalls. All students could improve their earning. We carry out the training every year. Our parent society donates the required tool kit to every trainee. Students prepare the crafts in spare time. Another training for 'Rakhi'

Manufacturing from bamboo was also carried out by the cell. Rakhis worth Rs. 4000.00 were made by students. • Training program "Employability enhancement and youth livelihood": This training program was carried out jointly by Mahindra Pride Classroom project of Nandi Foundation, college IQAC and Career Guidance Cell of college. This was in pursuance of the vision and mission of collage. Team work, communication skills, time management, proper grooming and hygiene for professional enhancement, interview skills such were the topics addressed under the training program. 42 students participated in this 8 days long program. The training was conducted with ample use of ICT tools. • Add course on "Soft Skills development": This one week long course was conducted by collage career guidance cell. Some fifty students participated in the course. Understanding yourself, Goal Setting and Achieving, Self Talk, Communication Skills (Verbal) Body Language and presentation skills were the topics covered under this seven day long course. The course is carried out every year by Career Guidance Cell. • Training programme on "Honey Processing": As the Melghat region is a rich source of natural honey, we have honey bee keeping centre which creates awareness about Honey bee keeping and popularizes various methods for successful honey bee keeping. We have introduced B.Sc. Apiculture and other short term training programmes for the students and local people in order to provide them need based training. We have a honey processing plant and we provide honey processing services on minimal rates. The centre also works for the conservation of forest and environment by cultivating plants necessary for successful honey bee keeping with the help of varied flora richly available in Melghat. A 05 day long training programme on "Honey Processing" was arranged wherein 07 students participated. 5. Evidence of Success: All these initiatives could create employability awareness among students. Some students are now in possession of skills which could prove as a regular income source. Some students could earn partially and the thing to note is that they have gained confidence that once there education is over they would be in a position to easily start self employment endeavors. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Melghat not only lacks industrial areas but also lacks the required infrastructure. No industry exists here so we find it difficult to easily expose our students to industrial atmosphere. For first hand industrial experiences we have to move to the district place which is also not adequately industrialized and we here require financial resources. Moreover, there are limitations to the uses of natural resources here due to rigorous rules and regulations by Melghat Reserved Tiger Project. Best Practice II: 1. Title of the practice: Environmentfriendly initiatives 2. Objectives: • Create environmental awareness among the students, staff and society • Initiate environmental friendly steps like conservation, recycling, propagation and protection • Contribute to the maintenance of rich diversity of flora and fauna in the region of Melghat • To address pollution 3. The context: We being the higher education institute here in the lap of mother nature it becomes our prime most concern to sustain environment here. We carry out a number of activities as regards this concern. We do attempt to address the pollution to the best of our capabilities. 4. The practice: • Say No to Plastic Bags: Under the program of Swachha Bharat Swastha Bharat Department of Chemistry runs Say No to Plastic Bags drive the extension activity since academic session 2014 with the aim to create awareness about plastic bag pollution among the students and local people and to make this town of Chikhaldara entirely plastic free. The sole reason of undertaking this workshop is to make students understand the harm caused by plastic bags and to encourage them to replace plastic bags with paper bags. Students and local communities are made aware about evil effects of plastic through video clippings, talks, rallies, display boards and brochures etc. Old clothes are collected to prepare bags, which are distributed among local people including tourists. • Recycling of news paper In the academic year 201819 one day workshop on "Preparation of recycled newspaper bags" was organized under the extension activity Say No to Plastic Bags drive. In this

workshop Dr. Ku. S.N. Gupta, Associate Professor, Department of Chemistry Brijlal Biyani Science College, Amravati instructed the students on how to make paper bags and other articles like pen stand, Dust Bin, Pots, etc. by using old newspapers. The students prepared paper bags along with aforementioned articles. Afterwards they put their name, signature and a message "Say No To Plastics" on the article. All articles were distributed among students with the strong expectation to use it so as to make environment of Chikhaldara plastic free. • Rainwater Harvesting Department of Geology has been carrying out the extension activity since academic session 2014 on "Rainwater Harvesting" under the program of Swachha Bharat Swastha Bharat. As we do it regularly, last year the door to door and person to person awareness campaign was carried out by the B.Sc. III students in the Chikhaldara and surrounding villages viz., Aadnadi, Aaladoh, Shahapur, Mariyampur, Motha, Pandhari, Dhamangaon Gadi, Aamzari, Madki and Khatkali villages. During this campaign, the students circulated the pamphlet on rainwater harvesting and also dissipated information on construction of rainwater harvesting structure, need of rainwater harvesting, rules and regulation of rainwater harvesting, proper uses of water, importance of saving water, how to save water, etc. Total 580 houses were visited by the students during this campaign. The students encouraged house owner for the construction of rainwater harvesting structures as well as for saving of water. 5. Evidence of Success: We could meet and get in touch with most of the students and people through these programs. We developed sensitization about plastic pollution, rainwater harvesting and other environmental problems. Chikhaldara Municipal Council appreciated us. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required The inhabitants of Melghat are still educationally backward. It is always difficult to convince them to use ecofriendly items like cloth

bags and to afford additional expenditure to modify house construction in order to get rain water harvesting in place. Besides they don't directly encounter any pollution related problem. Their poor financial background also adds to our difficulty. The tourists staying here for a temporary period cannot be recontacted or recounseled. The concerning local authorities need to be more sensitive as regard ecofriendliness.

We undertake the following pieces of work under this initiative • Demarcation of grassland area by GPS • Grasses identification • Grasses seeds collection • Weeds identification and eradication • Seeds drying • Seeds broadcasting technique to staff. • Grasses plot management : Weeding , Demarcation , inspection path , monitoring • Interconnection of grasslands • Brushwood cutting in grasslands along roadside areas II Conservation and Propagation of Medicinal and Aromatic plants Some plants in reserve and buffer areas have medicinal values. These plants if nurtured and preserved properly

can help not only the tribal but all the needy people. This may emerge as the cottage industry for the inhabitants of Melghat. We make following efforts to develop and to preserve medicinal, aromatic and endangered plants. • Develop of nursery for Medicinal and Aromatic plants • Collect of plants in wild habitats • Work for soil treatment, CCT formation, plantation of the said plants and water management practices • Carry out field survey and study medicinal plants • Identify the distribution pattern and current status of medicinal plants • Collect and process data III Training forest field staff for grasslands management in protected Areas This practice includes training on: • Make year wise demarcation of grassland areas with GPS • Identify and enlist of grass species • Collect and broadcast of grass seeds • Weed eradication and management techniques • Grasses biomass management practices in mosaic pattern • Identification and cultivation of wild fruit trees IV Say No to Plastic Bags: Students and local communities are made aware about evil effects of plastic through video clippings, talks, rallies, display boards and brochures etc. Old clothes are collected to prepare bags, which are distributed among local people including tourists as an ecofriendly move.
