The prospectus, academic and activity plan of college are made available on college website. Records of student admission are maintained by College Automation Software. Semester and subjectwise Whatsapp groups are formed to share study material, university/college notices/guidelines. The college has "Examination Management Software System", which is in linkage with affiliating University, for University examination. Some of the departments carry out internal assessment by using eplatforms like Google Classroom, Whatsapp groups, etc. Internal examination data is uploaded on University examination portal. Question bank is shared with students through numerous eplatforms. Previous year question sets of university examination are made available on college website.

### CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

## 1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The college followed University-prescribed and designed curriculum. At the beginning of session, college prepares the academic and activity calendar for effective implementation of curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. College has faculty-wise time table committee which prepares timetable as per workload available for the academic session. A comprehensive teaching plan is prepared by every department. Departments use various eplatforms for smooth delivery of curriculum and evaluation process. The principal and faculty coordinators address the newly admitted students in Fresher's meet and orient them about academic and infrastructural facilities, code of conduct and discipline, add-on courses, extracurricular activities, university and college level examinations, welfare schemes, certificate courses and other schemes. Faculty members conduct one week bridge course for newly admitted students on the introduction of curriculum which prepare the students for understanding the syllabus of UG level. Unit tests are conducted periodically and results are discussed with students. Teachers provide models and specimen answers sheets, hard copies, CD's and web-site addresses to the students to enhance their knowledge. Library facilitates the effective implementation of curricula by providing text books, reference books, journals, e-books, etc. to the faculties and students. Faculty coordinators took review of the syllabus completion and issues regarding teaching learning process. Periodical meetings of departmental heads are held with the principal to review and discuss curriculum delivery. Departmental meetings for the review of teaching, unit tests, common tests, seminars and other activities are also conducted. Assignments, seminars and projects are given to the students under supervision of teacher. Guest lectures of eminent faculty members are arranged to give exposure of the current trends and latest subject knowledge. Study tours, excursions, field projects and industrial visit are organized. Workshop on "Teaching skills" is arranged for teachers. Learning through field visits, interactive sessions and competitions is facilitated. Teachers maintain academic diary in which the schedule of lectures, tutorials and practical is mentioned for an efficient learning environment. The diary is verified periodically. Teachers participate in FDPs and get updated. Teachers attended meetings of academic bodies like Faculty, Board of Studies of University. Some teachers actively participate in framing the curriculum in their capacity as members of the 'Board of Studies' for their respective subjects and some participate in workshops related to designing and development of the curriculum. The college motivates teachers by organizing programmes on teaching skills, use of library facilities, etc. Entry level test is organized to identify slow and advanced learners. Remedial coaching is provided to slow learners. Advanced learners have scope to experiment and go beyond the course while doing regular work and thereby to improve their presentation skills through coaching, project works, etc. They are facilitated for effective representation in inter-collegiate/University competitions. Topers are encouraged with cash prizes. The institution celebrates numerous days of national and international importance to inculcate values and unity among the students. Student-teacher guardian scheme is implemented for identifying problems of the students regarding academic, social and financial issues.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

#### Feedback Obtained

Feedback is an important part of the assessment process. Feedback helps to improve. Feedback committee collected feedback from the students, teachers, alumni and parents as a response to a questionnaire containing different questions covering curriculum, performance of faculties, library facilities, academics, infrastructure and other facilities. The filled in questionnaire was checked and data analysis was made on the basis of five point scale. The college collects the feedback physically from stakeholders viz students, alumni, faculties and parents on curriculum aspects and courses which are prescribed by the University. After collecting and assessing the feedback from the various stakeholders on curricular aspects, the valuable suggestions, if any, will be brought to the notice of the University Curriculum Committee for due changes in the course structure. The college conducts annual Alumni meet, in which suggestions and feedbacks are received from alumni. Whenever any alumni visit the college, feedback is sought. Besides this, analysis is made by observing students performance, faculty performance in every semester, utilization of infrastructure and requirements for quality enrichment of the college. College invites alumni to provide feedback online. Analysis of collected feedback is placed before College Development Committee and IQAC to

take necessary action. Furthermore, analysis of collected feedback is made available on college website. College follows a continuous review of the curriculum through Faculty Coordination Committee, IQAC, Management Meetings and College Development Committee. The functioning of various committees of the college is modified time to time as required by the feedback.

#### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Freshers are informed about various curricular and co-curricular activities. They are given an idea about teaching, learning and evaluation process along with college discipline and various students' support services. This introduction session is initiated by Faculty Coordination Committee. The Principal interacts with the students. Students have freedom to ask questions and express their views and opinions. Advanced and slow learners are identified with the help of Entry Level Test. Personal attention is provided through Palak-Yojna, an innovative scheme wherein a teacher adopts allotted number of students and provides academic and personal counselling to his/her wards and also keeps in touch with their parents. This facilitates regularity, enhances academic performance and participation of students in various activities especially of slow learners. Slow learners are paid special attention through Palak-Yojna. Easy identification of the problems is facilitated through personal interactions and cordial relationships between students and teachers under Palak-Yojna. Teachers make special efforts for bridging the knowledge gap and try to bring weaker students at par with other students. Most of the students come from disadvantaged tribal background. We provide extra study material, notes and enhance their language and communication skills. Students are given necessary mental and emotional support through personal counselling. Parents of weak learners are provided counselling and guidance when required. Data on the problems of the students is collected, compiled, analysed and used to help the students more effectively. Advanced learners are provided with additional resources. They are encouraged to use internet for supportive data/information. Periodic visits to training centres/industries as well as skill oriented and research training programmes are arranged. We have one to one interaction between teacher and the students in classes, laboratories, during field visits and in the premises. ICT based teaching learning works as an effective platform for teacher-student academic interactions. Various e-platforms are incorporated for teaching learning process.

During COVID-19 Pandemic period, we were in constant touch with most of the students. Carried out various activities to make them aware of pandemic and help them sustain their morale. Projects are allotted to students making them develop skills to think scientifically and inculcate research temperament. Assignments/seminars encourage self-study and develop self-reliance of students. Issues and concerns are discussed in the classes which promote students to build up their perspective, thoughts and ideas. Appropriate perspective of students towards such problems and concerns is streamlined. Wi-Fi enabled departments allow students to easily access the e-learning resources. Movies relevant to the demand of syllabi are screened. Confidence and capacity building strategies for students include library orientation, soft skills development, life skills training, awareness training programmes for utilizing institutional facilities, etc. Workshops on Stress Management, Goal Setting, Communication Skills, Personality Development, Time Management, Healthy Competitive Spirit, etc. are organized. Team work, leadership skills, management skills are inculcated among students through group discussions, question-answer sessions, project work and inter subject seminar competition. College website provides necessary information to the aspirants. Teachers are always ready and available for the students.

Open book tests are arranged. Students are allowed to check and evaluate the answer-sheets of their mates. A system of attainment level-analysis helps for improvisation. Examination Committee carries out effective implementation of examination, assessment and elaborately discusses evaluation criteria with faculties. Modifications and changes, if any, are communicated to concerned. It plans and implements assessment process to evaluate the students' performance. Examination Committee ensures confidentiality regarding question papers setting. Notices regarding prevention of unfair means are circulated. Whenever new evaluation method is prescribed by university, it is communicated. The process of continuous internal evaluation consists of: written test, term paper, lectures, seminar, MCQs, short quizzes, assignments, extension work, etc. Fieldworks/visits are also a part of assessment and evaluation is done on overall performance of students during visit and a report submitted there on. Examination committee ensures that the evaluation procedure is carried out as per norms. Behavioural aspects of the students are evaluated on the basis of interest in academics, skill learning, capabilities like problem solving, team work and overall response to activities. The same is discussed in detail with students by teachers. Students as well as their parents are adequately informed about examination and evaluation criteria. The college and the university have a Grievance Redressal Cell to which students can appeal. In addition to this, parent teacher provides personal attention to grieving students and ensures that they are satisfied.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

We have sound mechanism to ensure smooth conduct of examination, evaluation and other related matters within the stipulated time frame. At the end of last academic session, academic calendar for the next session is prepared by taking the affiliating university academic calendar into consideration. In the beginning of every academic year planning and organizing the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules is completed, through formulating academic calendar, teaching and evaluation plan. The details are provided in college prospectus, academic diary prescribed to the teaching staff and on the college website. Orientation programme for fresher's is organized every year to introduce them to academic calendar, activity plan, teaching, learning and evaluation process. They are well informed about overall functioning of the college. The department wise time-table for examination and other related matters is prepared in the beginning of each semester by respective departments. The time table is displayed on the notice board and discussed in detail with students. Affiliating university has prescribed the semester system for all programmes in the faculties of Sciences, Arts and Commerce, which has been adopted by the college as it is. Students are examined and their works are evaluated as per the university norms. Changes in schedules if any are communicated to heads of department, staff members and students. College internal examination committee effectively carries out the whole process of internal evaluation. These activities are continuously monitored by the principal coordination committee and heads of department. Periodic meet with the management ensures effective implementation of the planning.

1. Constitution of College Development Committee (CDC): College Development Committee (CDC) is the constitutional body that the college is required to set up under the state universities act. The composition of the committee ensures the participation of the important stakeholders. The CDC comprises the members from teachers, non-teaching staff, students, the society, academicians and the management. All the important policy decisions regarding the academic administration of the college are discussed and approved by the CDC. It also governs the financial management. It also approves major submissions to the Authorities, especially Government bodies, NAAC and University for properness and effectiveness of required information. In a way CDC ensures the decentralisation of responsibilities and power and acts as role model for participative management. 2. Decentralization of the authority and operational autonomy: For the decentralization of the authority and operational autonomy various important committees are formed like IQAC, UGC Planning and Management Board, Purchase Committee, Faculty Coordination Committee, Research Club, Cultural Committee, Library Advisory Committee, Building Committee and Sports Committee, etc. Principal as the head of the institution provides autonomy to all the committees and the departments in planning and implementation of the teaching learning, research, extra curricular and extension activities. The budgetary provisions are made as per the requirement of each department. The amount is allotted and utilized on the basis of priority with the approval of purchase committee. Head of the department has academic functional freedom. He allocates the workload prepares timetable, conducts Tests Seminars, etc. under the guidelines given by the principal and university. Institution promotes a culture of participative management as the Principal is given freehand by the Management of the institution. The Principal exercises his powers effectively. He is the Chairman of the staff council and all teaching and non-teaching staff are the members. Through interactions with HODs and faculties better implementation of all academic programmes is done. Departments and the various committees coordinate with IQAC and submit the annual plans. These are approved by IQAC and Planning board.

Various social issues and concerns are discussed in the classes which promote students to adopt broader views and perspectives and which enhances independent learning among the students. Appropriate perspective of students towards such problems and concerns is streamlined. Research laboratories, botanical garden, English language laboratory, celebration of national days also add qualitatively to teaching learning process.
